KIWANIS FOUNDATION OF CANADA

DLG Jim Scott gave a very informative presentation on the Kiwanis Foundation of Canada.

The foundation was formed in 1971 by Past KI VP Mel Osborne and encompasses members from three Kiwanis Districts – Eastern Canada, Western Canada and Kiwanians from British Columbia in the Pacific Northwest District.

Jim joined the foundation board six months ago. As LG he saw the great work of the foundation in helping Kiwanis grow. The purpose of the foundation is financial support of:

Sponsored Leadership Programs Encourage scholarships Assist those in need Disaster relief

In just 40 days the foundation raised \$164,000 for disaster relief for the 4 million children at risk in the Philippines. Canadian Kiwanians made a difference.

The foundation receives funds primarily from individuals. Funds are also received from corporations, other foundations and groups. All funds are used to carry out the stated purpose of the foundation unless donation designated by donor.

The newest initiative of the foundation is the **new club building grant**. For every adult Kiwanis club chartered between 1 October 2013 and 30 September 2014, \$750.00 will be donated to the service account of the new club and \$750.00 to the service account of the sponsoring club. At the beginning of the new club's second year \$100.00 per member above the charter membership will be donated to the service account to a maximum of \$500.00.

For existing clubs that achieve charter strength in the 2013-14 Kiwanis year a grant of \$100.00 for each member added to a maximum of \$500.00 will donated to their service account.

New member sponsor contest

For each new member sponsored into a club, the new member and the sponsoring member are entered into the contest. First prize is a trip to the Kiwanis International convention in Japan – 2 airline tickets, 5 nights accommodations, convention registration and \$1,500.00 cash.

Second prize is a trip to the District convention – for Eastern Canada Kiwanians that is 2 airline tickets to Prince Edward Island, 4 nights accommodations and convention registration.

The contest draw date is 31 March 2014.

The Kiwanis Foundation of Canada offers a matching scholarship program to clubs who support the foundation with an annual club donation. The foundation will match up to \$1,000.00.

The foundation offers a \$500.00 grant to any club sponsoring a new sponsored leadership club.

The foundation pays \$50.00 for each Key Leader registration.

ELIMINATE campaign matching grant

For every \$3.00 donated by clubs, the foundation donates \$1.00. The foundation has committed \$500,000 to this matching grant.

The Kiwanis Foundation of Canada is a leader in the Kiwanis World using funds to help Kiwanis.
