PP Ken introduced our guest speaker for the evening, MP Dave Van Kesteren.

Dave Van Kesteren was elected as the Member of Parliament for Chatham-Kent-Essex in January 2006 as a Conservative Government Member of Parliament, led by Prime Minister Stephen Harper. His election to office in 2006 marked the first time in 17 years that Chatham-Kent-Essex had elected a Conservative Member of Parliament.

Prior to becoming the Member of Parliament for Chatham-Kent-Essex, Dave worked in the auto industry. In 1985, Dave opened his first auto body shop, later running his own used car business and then becoming a Hyundai dealer in 1996.

Born in Chatham to Dutch parents who immigrated to Canada in the early 1950`s, he is the fifth child of ten children. Strong proponents of family values, Dave and his wife, Faye, have celebrated 34 years of marriage and have eight adult children, and have been blessed with many grandchildren.

In the 39th Parliament, as the newly elected Member of Parliament, for Chatham-Kent-Essex he was a Member of the Standing Committee on Access to Information, Privacy and Ethics; the Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology; and the Subcommittee on Oil and Gas and other Energy Prices. In the 40th Parliament he was again a Member of the Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology; the Standing Committee on Fisheries and Oceans; and completed his first chairmanship of the Sub-Committee on Canadian Industrial Sectors. For the second session of the 40th Parliament, he was a Member of the Standing Committee on the Status of Women and Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology. Currently, in this third session of Parliament, he continues his work as a Member of the Standing Committee on Industry, Science and Technology and the Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs and International Development.

He is an active member on numerous Parliamentary Associations and Interparliamentary Groups. Specifically, the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association, Canada-United States Interparliamentary Group, Canada-United Kingdom Interparliamentary Association, Canada-Japan Inter-Parliamentary Group, Canada-Israel Interparliamentary Group, Canada-Europe Parliamentary

Association, Canada-China Legislative Association, Canada-Africa Parliamentary Association, and Canada-Taiwan Friendship Group. This does not include the several other Friendship groups he is associated with including the Canada-Netherlands Friendship Group of which he is Chair. He is also the founder and Chair of the Canadian Trucking Industry Caucus and several other Caucuses that focus on specific issues related to Canadian industry sectors.

Dave has had several opportunities to travel internationally on behalf of the Government of Canada. He traveled to Taiwan in 2006 with the Chinese International Economic Cooperation Association to further Canada's diplomatic trade relations in the region, to China in 2007 and again to Taiwan in 2008 with other government Members to Celebrate the Presidential Inauguration. He and Faye had the honour of traveling to Israel in July of 2007 with the Canada-Israel Committee. In August 2008 he attended the Southern Governors Association Annual General Meeting in Greenbrier, West Virginia. In February of 2010 he and Faye had the honour of traveling to Turkey along with other Members of Parliament from all Parties.

Dave continues to represent the people of Chatham-Kent-Essex and their interests at the Federal level. He is very proud of the riding and works hard every day to keep Canada a strong and prosperous nation, not only for our generation but for those generations to come.

Dave spoke to our club about his travels throughout the world. He feels Canadians are the most fortunate people in the world and it is an honour for him to act as an ambassador for Canada as he travels. He visited Urkraine two years ago with the ministry of foreign affairs. In Ukraine 47% of the land is farmland yet so much is not used. The country does not value the concept of private land ownership and so the citizens continue to be very poor. Canadians are the best farmers in the world and could teach citizens in poorer countries so much.

Dave travelled with an organization Engineers Without Borders to South Sudan and Ghana. Both these countries have the capacity to feed themselves and be the bread basket of that area of

Africa. When they visited rural villages of South Sudan, they were welcomed by the elders when they made it known they were there to learn from them and to help them. Engineers Without Borders go into villages and offer them equipment to enable them to farm more land. They also help build storage bins, allowing them to store then sell their corn when prices are higher. We now have a way to help these people.

Canada can help by working hand in hand with industry. Canadians are the best miners in the world so by partnering with mining companies they can help these developing countries. If we are able to help these countries to start working and trading with each other, perhaps it will give them less reason to fight with their neighborours.

There are organizations on the ground in these developing countries that need our help. By supporting these organizations we can help the citizens of these countries.

Dave spoke about the importance of working with Turkey and encouraging the country to keep progressing. Turkey is an important country in the world – it is the door way to the Islamic World. It is hoped by some that a strong Turkey could help solve the conflict between the West and the Islamic world.

Following his presentation, Dave presented KI VP Dr. John with a Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal.

Walter Zeller Fellowship Award

The Walter Zeller Fellowship Award was created to recognize clubs or individuals for protecting and saving the lives of 690 young women and their future babies, through a contribution to the Global Campaign for Children, the Eliminate Project.

In 1940, one year after the Kiwanis International Foundation was established as a legal entity, Walter Zeller made the first donation: 25 Canadian silver dollars that he hoped would turn into the foundation's nest egg.

This donor's dream came true. The coins were used to create a cake which was auctioned for US\$625. His coins launched the Kiwanis International Foundation's worldwide service efforts. A native of Waterloo County (near the city of Kitchener, Ontario), Zeller was the founder of Zellers chain of thrift stores. He began his business career in 1912 with a job as a stock boy with the F.W. Woolworth Company, and was later the General Sales Manager for the Metropolitan chain of stores for New York. He was considered by co-workers to be energetic, forthright, and magnetic, and served as director-at-large of the National War Savings Committee and a special advisor to the chairman of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

Zeller gave much of his life to philanthropy, serving as the Montreal Director of the YMCA and staying involved in many capacities with his Kiwanis club. He served as the Montreal President and Governor of the Ontario-Quebec-Maritime District.

Thirty-five years in our Kiwanis Club – PP Craig

As one of the younger members when I joined, it was a privilege to know many of our Charter members, to attend Kiwanis with my Dad and to hear original members talk about the 'infant' days of our club and many of their accomplishments and escapades .

While the 'old pavilion' at Rondeau Park burned a couple of years before I joined, the 'Kiwanis' summer dances were very popular and a great fund raiser for our club. We ran the canteen and helped with building maintenance. Alcohol was prohibited but Kiwanis could be counted on for an ample supply of ice and tonic water!

Each spring our annual Flower Day sale was held. Past President Stan Eskritt operated a business where Kettle's is located. Roses were the flowers for many years until cost forced us to carnations. We boxed and delivered the flowers from Stan's. Our partners always helped and I have to believe flower day got more than one member out of the dog house!

Monthly, our directors handled requests for assistance from the community. Often it was for dental, optical, financial or special medical needs. With educators and doctors in the club the needs were known and we quietly helped many young people particularly before so many social services were available. We canvassed the town with Vial of Life medical info kits for every home and provided the fire department with Jaws of Life equipment.

A highlight to all members involved was partnering with Ontario Special Olympics to host a weekend long indoor soccer tournament. We billeted the players and coaches at the college and fed everyone [200 in attendance one year]. This was one of the most rewarding and fun projects ever for our club!

Early days of our Teddy Bear Picnic [known then as Teddy Bear Fair] were exciting. The 'Miracle Child' and family, as well as reps from Children's Hospital, usually attended. The fair was held in Mickle Park with food, the bear hospital, the parade, contests, music, fresh pop corn and more. Sweat shirts and t-shirts from Children's Hospital, by way of chairs Peter and Dale, were sold over the years. Many of our members participated 'on air' at the telethon in London that followed and the Ridgetown Club has received accolades from Children's for our support.

It was always a treat to hear charter members talk about the Santa Clause parade. The community identifies this annual event with our Club. Early parades were modest and continued to grow to one of the best and biggest in the area. Float decoration before and after parade parties are a long tradition; one I sadly usually missed with the store open Friday nights and Saturdays. We enjoyed making pop corn balls with Elliott Pinnell and packing up to 1000 bags of candy to accommodate the end of baby boomers and the echo generation. We've been blessed with some great Santa's [present one included!] including one who promised a member's child a pony. Past President [local pharmacist] Cam Nelson had to deliver!

Robarts Golf, now the Eb Goldhawk Memorial, began a twenty three year tie with the Robarts Research Institute in London. That has seen our division raise over \$400,000.00 We've had a lot of fun on the golf course and overwhelmed Robarts with our support. Eb's travels to promote the tournament, his organizing skills and constant follow up with committee members was legendary and produced results. 'Kudos to those who carried on and have done a great job with the tournament, despite economic challenges and an over abundance of charity tournaments today. When our IDD co-chairs, Eb and John, challenged the club to raise \$50,000.00 it seemed out of reach. They skillfully brought the club and entire community on board. Trivia nights began in support of IDD. As success continued momentum and financial goals grew. You know the end result. IDD was a great success. Our club was recognized as a world leader. Our International President Bo visited Ridgetown [see the plaque at Kiwanis Park] and I believe this was one of the many accomplishments that drew attention to and started our current International Vice President on the road to Indianapolis.

I've probably already written twice what our Editor expected or wanted. Haven't touched on so many good memories including Genoa inter-clubs with weekend stays in Ohio; Past President Ken's famous mystery tours [probably shouldn't be in print anyway!]; a club boat excursion across Rondeau Bay to Erieau for dinner and our almost safe return; all the fun at our meetings from fines to court cases; an after dinner joke from Bob McHardy; political banter between Dr. Jim and Eb; Peter and Dale marshalling yet another parade; how blessed we've been to have secretaries and treasurers who served for years and years; inter-clubs and conventions and how rewarding and educational they are; the importance of a service club to the community and the esteem I believe this club holds here and in the Kiwanis World.
