Fifty years in our Kiwanis Club - PLG Peter

My involvement in Kiwanis began when I was a student – not as a Key Clubber – but as a summer job. I worked at the Ontario Stock Car Championships, at the admission gates. I joined Kiwanis in September 1961, sponsored by Cam Nelson. I was President in 1987-88 and Lt. Governor of Division 4 in 1996-97. I was certified trainer of club officers for several years and honoured by the club with a Mel Osborner Fellowship, a George F. Hixson Fellowship, recently a Walter Zeller Fellowship.

In November 1961, two months after joining the club, the project chairman put his hand on my shoulder and said, "it's time to get ready for the Santa Parade and you are in charge this year." My Kiwanis education began quickly! That year we packed 2,000 bags of candy that included nuts, hard rock candy and handmade popcorn balls. Lee Simpson made the hard rock candy and candy canes. The candy canes were auctioned at a Kiwanis meeting. This was in the 1960's – candy canes went for \$10.00, \$15.00, \$25.00 and even \$50.00!

In my early years with the club, there was stiff competition for the perfect attendance awards. If a member missed a meeting there were several ways to "make-up" that meeting. One

of the make-ups was to attend an interclub. It was not unusual for four members to realize they needed a make-up, so off they would go to visit another club. I attended many, many interclubs, making many long time friendships and a great way to expand your Kiwanis experience. Another make-up was to attend a meeting of a sponsored leadership club – Key Club or Circle K. Many members attended Key Club meetings just as Key Clubbers attended our meetings.

In 1969 the Rondeau Pavilion was the project that earned the \$20,000 donated to the Ridgetown Swimming Pool. When the pool project came to the club it was a huge commitment for the club and a few thought it couldn't be done. Two members actually resigned from the club. Two years later the funds were raised and the pool is still used by the youth of Ridgetown.

Over the years the club has supported the town tennis courts, Ridge House Museum and delivered (in all kinds of weather) Christmas food baskets to those in need. Members, with much help from our spouses, made paper mache Sesame Street characters to be used in the Santa Claus parade. A lot of glue and "merriment" went into those costumes and many of them can still be found stored in the basement of the Royal Bank.

In 1990 yours truly proposed a project to the club – a teddy bear fair. The comments were along the lines of, "old men playing with teddy bears, but once a child always a child". Twenty-three teddy bear fairs/picnics later we are still providing the youth of our community with a special day – in all kinds of weather. In my archives of the picnics, I still have the first letter of permission from the Town of Ridgetown, signed by then Town Administrator Gerald Secord. Each year the Children's Hospital of Western Ontario chose a Miracle Child, a patient or previous patient, to be the "face of the foundation fundraising" for the year. The miracle child attended events in the city of London. Working with the Children's Hospital of Western Ontario Foundation, I invited the miracle child to our first teddy bear fair. Our fair was the first event outside of London to have the miracle child in attendance. For many, many fairs the miracle child continued to attend and participate in the parade and events. The first miracle child to attend our fair was a young girl from Chatham, Kelly Jacobsen, and she returned to our event just a few years ago!

For many years the Children's Hospital's year of fundraising ended with the Miracle Network Telethon on CFPL TV. Dale, Craig and I attended many telethon kick-off luncheons. During the years of the telethon, our club presidents made on-air cheque presentations. I remember one telethon where Jake Campbell, the Miracle Child, stole the show. The countdown to go on air, "5, 4, 3, - Mom - 2, 1 (on air) I have to pee."!

Key Club has always been the pride and joy of our club since its inception. I missed joining the Key Club, I graduated RDHS one year before the Key Club was chartered. Many chairmen and presidents relate to attending conventions with Key Club members.

Fundraising has always found its objectives to support so many needs within our community and beyond - medical equipment, playground equipment, Christmas lights, Children's Hospital, cancer, ride for heart, 4H, trees program, Chatham-Kent Health Alliance nursery, IDD and the ELIMINATE project – but a few of the many.

The list goes on and it shows a need and desire to serve - if we should lose the need and desire so will our commitment to serving the children of the world.

Personal satisfactions – fellowship, working together, making things happen, interclub, not as much as I used to, conventions district & international, community service. All companies ask their employees to become involved in community service. While working for Union Gas I was awarded the "Award of Excellence for Community Service". The award was \$1,000.00 which I split \$500.00 to Children's Hospital of Western Ontario and \$500.00 to Robarts Research Institute.

It has a been a pleasure to be associated with Kiwanis, its members and especially the Ridgetown community.
