### **Forensic Identification Services**

Gary Scoyne was born and raised in Ridgetown. He is the son of Murray and Doris Scoyne and the son-in-law of PLG Peter Guyitt. Gary is a graduate of Ridgetown District High School and Conestoga College. After graduating from Conestoga he joined the City of Chatham Police force then transferred to the Ontario Provincial Police force. He currently lives in Simcoe with his wife Kim (Guyitt) and they have three children.

Gary is a senior forensic identification officer working out of the Tillsonburg Forensic Investigation & Support Bureau. He has over 30 years policing experience and over 25 years of that experience as a Forensic Identification Officer. He is a Scene of Crime Officer trainer, a Fingerprint Examiner and DNA Data Bank trainer. In January he is transferring to the Chatham Forensic Investigation Unit.

Gary talked about what the Forensics Units do for investigations. "Forensics breaks down to one thing – the Locardian Principle. That principle is – every contact leaves a trace. That trace is two way, from suspect/victim to the crime scene and from the crime scene to the suspect/victim." The Forensic Identification Unit attends Break & Enters, Explosions, Homicides/death investigations, Drug investigations and Sexual assaults. Their duties at such investigations may be: fingerprint impressions, footwear impressions, tire tread impressions, DNA samples and photographs of the scene.

Following his presentation on how the Forensics Unit operates, Gary talked about the Tori Stafford case. This was the murder of a young girl in Woodstock, Ontario. The investigation went from April 8, 2009 (date of crime) to May 11, 2012 (date of conviction). Gary was the lead Identification officer on the case and was the only officer to testify at the 10-week trial. Many of us from this area remember this case and it was extremely interesting to hear and see the details of the crime.





Gary brought some very interesting items with him as well as story boards used at the trial.

The Kiwanis Club of Ridgetown meets weekly at 6:30 pm in the basement of Mount Zion Presbyterian Church, 59 Main St. E., Ridgetown, every Thursday, from September 1<sup>st</sup> through June 30<sup>th</sup> each year. Summer meetings are hosted by members at various local addresses.



## **Kiwanis Timeline**

#### 1918

Total membership reaches approximately 10,000.

The first Kiwanis headquarters is established in Chicago.

Roe Fulkerson is named the first editor of Kiwanis magazine at the Providence convention.

### 1919

Kiwanis moved from its first, two-room office to Chicago's Mallers Building, where it remained until 1924.

#### 1919 - MAY 21

Convention attendees in Birmingham, Alabama, raise US\$17,500 in less than 10 hours to buy Kiwanis from founder Allen Browne.

#### 1920

Total membership reaches 28,500 in 267 clubs. Roe Fulkerson coins the motto "We Build," saying Kiwanis clubs build communities.
